



Federal Arts/Nonprofit Updates

- □ For FY23 National Endowments for the Arts (NEA) & Humanities (NEH) were allocated \$207 Million Each.
 - ☐ **Highest allocation EVER** (not accounting for inflation)
 - □ **62¢ per capita**, goal is \$1 per capita.
- □ Current FY24 NEA and NEH Funding Request is \$211 Million Each (amount requested by President Biden).





S.566: Charitable Act

- ☐ Would allow tax filers using standard deduction (90% of tax filers) to deduct donations as well.
- ☐ Up to \$4,600 for Individuals and \$9,200 for couples.
- ☐ Bipartisan Sponsors: 7 Republicans, 7 Democrats



Federal Creative Economy/Arts Legislation

Arts Education for All (AEFA) Act

- □ Supports arts education from pre-K through 12th grade, and in the juvenile justice system.
- ☐ Plans to reintroduce for **Arts in Education Week**, September 10-16.



Promoting Local Arts and Creative Economy Workforce (PLACE) Act

- ☐ Amends existing legislation to include the arts (tax law, disaster relief, etc.), creates new grants and directs funding to creative businesses.
- ☐ Includes Performing Artist Tax Parity Act (PATPA) which updates the tax code, so performing arts workers can deduct common business expenses.



Comprehensive Resources for Entrepreneurs in the Arts to Transform the Economy (CREATE) Act

☐ Expands SBA and EDA loan programs and integrates creative work into support programs.



Saving Transit Arts Resources (STAR) Act

☐ Created by NC Rep. Alma Adams: Restores local control for art expenses in federally funded transit projects.







































NC Arts Council, NC Department of Natural and Cultural Resources

The NCGA & NC Arts Council stabilized the arts industry with CARES and ARPA funds.

- NC Arts Council awarded 62% more direct grants in FY23 than before COVID-19.
 - 39% of that increase was to grantees that had never received NCAC funding.
 - Many of those new grantees are from rural and underserved communities.







The Arts & Culture sector in 2021, according to the US Bureau of Economic Analysis:

- Generated \$20.2 billion (3.1% of the State GDP)
- Supported 125,636 jobs (2.6% of NC employment)
- Provided \$10.5 billion in compensation.

The NC Arts Council:

- Serves all 100 counties supporting diverse geographies and communities.
- Provides industry leadership that is crucial for support of the arts sector statewide.
- Has 50+ years of experience which enabled them to adapt quickly to the crisis of the last several years and administer funding, training, and expertise where needed.








H136: Arts Proficiency High School Diploma Endorsement

Passed the House 114-0. Action needed in the Senate.

- Awarded to high school graduates who:
 - o Complete four art credits with a 3.0 GPA or higher
 - o Engage in 40 hours of extra-curricular arts activities.
- There is **no allocation needed** to implement the Arts Diploma Endorsement.
- Creativity is considered the most important skill for employees by 72% of business leaders.
- Local School Boards (LEAs) determine eligible extra-curricular arts activities, which cannot be for school credit, and may include local arts nonprofits.






H498: Provide Music & Visual Art instruction to all K-5 students in North Carolina.

On average, 1 of every 20 public school students does not have both Music and Visual Art instruction.

- Local Education Agencies (LEAs) would provide both Music and Visual Arts
 - o Instruction by a certified Music/Visual Art teacher,
 - o For no less than 30 minutes every five instructional days, and
 - o To no more than a standard classroom size for each grade level.
- Of the more than 630,000 K-5 public school students, **96% are enrolled in Music** and **94% in Visual Art**.
- Research shows the arts increase student engagement which improves student behavior and addresses learning loss and student mental health.
- NCGA passed SL-2018-2 and already provides roughly \$250 million for Program Enhancement Teachers (Music, Visual Art, P.E., etc.) for K-5 students. (1 teacher for every 191 students)

\$1.5 million for A+ Schools of North Carolina over 2 or 3 years.

- A private foundation would match state funds & match private donations up to \$500,000.
- Whole-school arts-integration- based reform model operated within the NC Arts Council.
- Founded in NC in 1995, the program has expanded nationally and internationally and needs renewed investment.


