


Culture Blocks Footprint

CULTURE BLOCKS PROGRAM THEMES BY GEOGRAPHY

Sometimes, listening is the best plan of action, and so Culture Blocks came to be. Dedicated to building stronger relationships with specific geographic areas, Culture Blocks helps vibrant programming meet people exactly where they are: in the recreation center, at the library, and beyond. Below is a list of community feedback on important themes for which art, science, history and heritage programming could respond. Interested program providers must clearly state in their proposal how the programming responds to the themes through the integration and/or expression of art, science, history, and heritage.

- Community Development (address gentrification issues, corridor revitalization, creative placemaking)
- Science/Nature Programs
- Youth Cultural Education (to include music and dance programs)

Responding: Community Engagement versus Community Benefit/Impact

- •Seeking to fund experiences that relate to the community in an appropriate way; programs are deeply valuable to community
- •Pursuing sustainability by involving methods to include all stakeholders in creation, decision-making, and execution of activities

Program Highlights

- Expanded from 5 to 9 geographically specific communities
- 1,278 programs and 31,070 participant experiences
- More than 40 programming facilities
- Over 55 cultural organization partners and 30 creative individual partners (more than 40 new cultural program partners in addition to ASC's traditional grantees).
- Forged relationships with more than 35 community groups (neighborhood organizations, civic groups, community coalitions, CDCs, etc.).
- Programs have responded to community-identified concerns such as gentrification, health and wellness, programs for seniors, building community among and between diverse neighborhoods, youth development and more.
